Early in World War II, government posters like this entreated New Zealand civilians to support the war effort. People not in the armed forces were encouraged to give their time and money.

Home front defences

In 1942, the government introduced new requirements. If you weren't in the forces, and you were an able-bodied man aged between 16 and 66, you had to join the Emergency Defence Corps. If you were aged between 35 and 50, you had to join the Home Guard.

The Home Guard patrolled isolated coastlines, ready to oppose the enemy. Uniforms and weapons were in short supply – a sore point with members. Some enthusiastic units used poles or wooden guns for practice.

Men and women could be members of the Emergency Precautions Scheme, which was the equivalent of Civil Defence today. The scheme was established before the war, in 1935, and its job was to respond to enemy attacks and natural disasters. Air raids, gas attacks, fires, and earthquakes were its main concerns.

THE NEW ZEALAND HOME GUARD DURING WORLD WAR II

New Zealand introduced conscription into the armed forces in 1940, under National Service Emergency Regulations.

The New Zealand Home Guard, also established in 1940, was based on the British model, with a Dominion commander, three military district commanders and 16 area officers.

The Home Guard was initially voluntary and unpaid, and open to men over 16 years of age who were not part of the active defence force. From 1942, joining the Home Guard was made compulsory for men aged 35 to 50 years. Men who worked in essential industries could be exempted from Home Guard service. At its peak, the Home Guard had approximately 119,000-123,000 uniformed members.

The purpose of the Home Guard was to train and prepare to defend New Zealand in the event of a Japanese attack, particularly in the northern provinces, where such an attack seemed most likely. Members were provided with training and weaponry, although many had to provide their own, or use wooden guns for practice. Home Guard membership was localised, with some units patrolling beaches.

A key responsibility of Home Guard units was creating obstacles to frustrate a Japanese invasion. This included creating barbed wire entanglements and concrete pill boxes on beaches, destroying infrastructure such as the wooden wharf at Bucklands Beach that an invading force might use, and establishing bomb shelters for the long-range emergency radio operation at Musick Point. The Bucklands Beach platoon patrolled the beaches from Mangere to Bucklands Beach during the 1941 rumours of Japanese submarine invasion. The Home Guard also imposed and enforced a blackout.

Men who served six months or more in the Home Guard were eligible for a medal for service to New Zealand. The New Zealand Home Guard was slowly disbanded by the end of 1943.



WHAT & WHO IS HOME GUARD GLOBAL?

The principle of the Guard is to establish autonomous Companies globally and throughout greater New Zealand, to participate in community projects targeted at freedom-friendly citizens who may be at this time feeling Stateless.

Stateless meaning; those who have become disenfranchised from our Home and Country, to a point to where you/they feel you/they need to take control of the circumstance about yourself/them.

HOW DOES THIS WORK?

The concept is derived from the British model of Home Guard during World War II. Taking that ideal and bringing a more modern spin to it.

Ideally each region has its own Head of Command who co-ordinates project/s that are for both the general public who can apply, as well as support to those on our recruit file. This is called a Work Order.

WHAT IS A WORK ORDER?

A process to apply for help in any form. This could be as simple as care-giving to construction, right through to security, both domestic and international. All applications are considered without prejudice or delay. THE QUESTION IS:

WHO CAN JOIN?

Home Guard seeks personnel from 18 years upwards. It is the core stance of Home Guard to have purpose for all, that in these circumstances we are in today, feel they provide value. Let it be known that this ideal is **NOT** a paramilitary or revolutionary force. It is for all personnel to find Patriotism and Belonging. All Flag Colours are welcome. The Colour on the Header (opposite page) speaks to all who desire to create a Fleet.

WHAT IS THE MAIN OBJECTIVE OF THE HGG?

In the first instance, the Admiral is to form up Companies to register recruits on to an analogue registry, in support of the main mission.

The mission is to firstly have 10,000 (10k) civilians sign on to a triplicate document at the request of the Rear Admiral of the Royal NZ Navy. To signal a civil response that will indicate to the Admiralty, that we the civilian population have a consensus that are willing to enforce Kings' Bench Lore of Westminster and reinstate Native Common law.

Whereby, establishing Sovereignty of the individual and greater community at large. Kings Bench Lore is represented in the Header flag/s, or The Confederation of Chiefs United Tribes of the World.

WHAT IS THE TRIPLICATE DOCUMENT FOR & WHERE IS IT HELD?

There are three analogue forms to fill in. One is consent to the Chain of Command. Another is a 3x carbon duplicate of a serial number and Claim ID. Then the last is a ledger copy for redundant archive.

All these administration assets are keep off-site in a secure safe. Each Command is duty-bound to ensure this is correctly followed. Master copies will be held in secure safe. The Home Office will from time to time relay each company's registry for main-framing.

There will be no digital copies of any of this administration. Only a basic mainframe database will be kept for communication purposes, such as updates, rosters, newsletters and gatherings.

This Mission will require some logistics. It is required that every recruit uses his or her own hand on all parts of the sign-up. This ensures no fraud takes place to stack the numbers. The Admiral would at times suitable call to parade each Company as it grows.

Each company must reach out to the other for support and any assistance they may require. With this ideal, the concept of a fleet or flotilla becomes realized. Your Command is essential to the HGG's viability.

WHAT IS EXPECTED FROM A RECRUIT?

To offer either: 100, 500 or 1000 hours annually to community duty. As mentioned above, this could be deployed in many ways, suited to skill-set. Home Office gives each hour a minimum monetary value of \$150.00 (NZ). This is where your claim number comes in. This is offset as part of the Work Order. The recipient is issued with the hours and values, not including materials, in the first instance.

The primary value is time banking, whereby the recipient in return can offer goods, services and/ or time in kind. How HGG see this operation is to cooperate as like-minded people with a military approach. This then moves toward more extensive training in selected Able Seamen type duties. Therefore Teamship, Patriotism and Belonging.

NORTHLAND NZ HOME GUARD WWII

WHAT DOES THE CLAIM FORM DO?

The recruit keeps these documents against Deployment served and documents their support. Coupled with this, it simply shows that you have registered and have been issued a formal analogue, or hard copy. Proof of each individual having hand-written his or her registration. There will be no digital copies made of any information entrusted to the Home Office. Only a contact mainframe with phone and emails linked to your serial number.

WHAT IS THE TOTAL VALUE OF THE CLAIM?

Theoretically, in the event the Guard gets to its mission target of ten thousand recruit (10k), at a sum of \$150.00 per hour at a minimum deployment period of 100 hours per annum equals: $10,000 \times 150 \times 100=150,000,000.00$ perceived value.


There is the value of the minimum deployment services.

Every recruit is then a shareholder in this ideal. The concept works in the vein of an insurance policy. Whereby giving the recruit a claim in the event the Home Guard become more ingrained into the public consciousness. Meaning this is a long-term legacy strategy, to go beyond the now into the future to stand up in unison with the existing framework i.e. Police, Fire Emergency, Civil Defence, First Responders, Armed Services, Intelligence etc.

HOW DO I SET UP A MEETING WITH THE ADMIRAL?

Firstly the Admiral must be invited on your deck, this being correct Naval procedure. The Admiral cannot arrange private public meetings, as this can be seen as incitement. With that the Home Office will liaise with the inviter as to schedules. The numbers for the initial meeting can be at the discretion of the invitee; once the first introduction is done there can be future bookings arranged. Once this has been completed and a registry of interest has been taken, a Commander will be appointed from your Region, City or Street for direct communication to the Bridge.

WHO CAN BE A COMMANDER?

Anyone can be a Commander, the skill-set is reliant on availability, the want to lead your area's Company, to continue to build upon your numbers and most of all have the security and wellbeing of your Command at the forefront of this position. This mainly consists of:

- + Keeping one's Command informed and structured
- + Seeking community activities that have a positive reflection of the Home Guard in its entirety
- + Having resources available such as reliable computer and phone systems and maintaining security of sensitive documentation
- + Having a Second in Command to assist in Home Guard communications and administration, a Staff Sargent if you will.

IS THERE A VETTING SYSTEM?

Vetting is entirely in the hands of each Company. As a measure, the Admiral is comfortable with any background to carry out leadership, this is a chance to re-invent oneself by name and past issues. In other words, a clean-slate approach. There again from the Home Office point of view, is trust put out there to all individuals to perform in the field honourably, respectfully and with integrity. As each individual is a reflection of the whole Guard equalling a Battalion, public credibility by way of our collective actions is crucial.

Keep in mind for this ideal to gain traction, all recruits must hold themselves steadfast, as they would expect the opposing identities to do, as this is the crux of why we are standing the Home Guard up.

IS THERE A TIME-LINE TO ACHIEVE THE TEN THOUSAND?

We have given ourselves twelve months to achieve something close to this number. Bearing in mind that this is the main Mission and the physical signing up does take some time and logistics to accomplish, as per the exercise performed to date with existing Companies.

When sufficient numbers are achieved, we will present our ledgers/documents to the Rear Admiral of the Royal New Zealand Navy. We will then Parade our numbers at Devonport Naval Base New Zealand in a presentation, followed by Trooping our colours in uniform at Patuone monument on North Head Auckland to proclaim our Kings' Lore.





HOME GUARD PIN: KINGS CROWN

This lapel pin was issued to service personnel for exceptional performance in the field and service to the Kings' Lore. The Kings are represented by the Crown above the HG font embossed in gold and embedded in Royal purple. This signifies the connection to Almighty God and the reverence to faith and good will to mankind. The historical principle of Home Guard is paramount to freedom. Peace is with you.

WHO IS THE OTHER?

The Other is in reference to the greater population within Home Guard or not. The infirm, the elderly, children, immigrants, and society as a whole. We must strive to create a safe and welcoming environment so as to have public buy-in to the principle of law and order. We cannot afford to fall into a place where we become the exact thing we are trying to change. Let's take from the best of public wellbeing services and improve on that.

We require ex-service personnel to assist in the training and building up of future watchhouses about the country, to where dialling 111 becomes a thing of the past. We could initiate an alternative emergency number; 777 for example.


